# A Word from Pastor Kelly Asking the Right Question

"Be anxious for nothing." Philippians 4:6

Our Lord's UMC has accomplished a milestone in ministry! Fifty-five years of service and mission to the glory of God. It's so interesting to read back through the early annual reports for the church; to appreciate the work and sacrifice of the early attendees. They trusted the vision and possibility of purpose for a mission church 'way out here' in New Berlin and there was energy in their risk and commitment. Roots are important as history is grounding. The ensuing years, muddy that ground a bit with its' fluctuation in experience, ministry effectiveness and sometimes just in mismatched leadership.

More will be announced soon, so keep praying and listening with eager anticipation!


And let us, together, pray daily the short line from Philippians 4, verse 6.


#### 2021 Charge Conference

#### **UMW Reading Program**

Due to a variety of factors, only one member completed the requirements for the 2021/2022 UMW Reading Program. Now that the church library is open on a limited basis, providing access to more books from the reading program, more UMW members are expected to participate in this worthwhile reading program in 2022.

The district Annual Gathering, scheduled for October 2, was cancelled due to the ongoing COVID pandemic and the illness of the speaker.

#### **UMW** and Pledges

Now that UMW will be meeting on a more regular basis, operating funds will be needed to help start up some programs, such as the Sunshine cards sent out by Rebecca Radick, our spiritual growth coordinator; buying fleece to make blankets for a homeless shelter; and books for the UMW Reading Program to put in the church library.

To help meet these programming expenses, many UMW members make a monetary pledge. Any pledge made is effective for the entire year in which it is made. In other words, if you make a pledge in November 2021, it is effective until November 2022. Any funds remaining after meeting the unit's annual expenses go toward national UMWsupported missions. You can give your UMW pledge with your Sunday offering, and it will be shown on your statement; please be sure it is clearly identified as such. Contact Carol Heinert, the UMW treasurer, if you need more information about pledging to UMW.

Due to the ongoing COVID pandemic, UMW will not have a fundraiser, such as the Christmas Cookie and Bake Sale, this year. Please consider how much you would spend to make cookies etc. and add that amount to your pledge.

#### Fellowship and Crafting

Starting Thursday, October 7, at 1:00 p.m. UMW will sponsor an afternoon of fellow-ship and crafting in the Garden Room. This time is open to all women of the church who want to chit-chat and/or work on crafts at the same time. The initial craft will be making fleece blankets for mission entities supported by Our Lord's. Ongoing crafts will include knitting/crocheting prayer shawls, filter socks for the Water with Blessings program, and hats, scarves, and mittens for the Mitten Tree. If you do not knit or crochet, there are many talented women who can help you to learn; scarves and filter socks are very easy to make.

Our supply of yarn needs to be replenished. If you have extras, please bring them along.

#### **Devotional**

"You know the saying, 'Four months between planting and harvest.' But I say, wake up and look around. The fields are already ripe for harvest. The harvesters are paid good wages, and the fruit they harvest is people brought to eternal life. What joy awaits both the planter and the harvester alike!" John 4:35-36 (NLT)

We are all, as followers and believers of Christ, called to missions. Just because you haven't packed up your belongings and moved to the other side of the world doesn't mean you are off the hook for sharing the Gospel.

lesus said, "In this world, you will have trouble, but fear not, I have overcome the world." (John 16:33) What great news! You don't have to look very far to feel the effects of the most recent troubles in our world today. It's all over many forms of media. Maybe your battle hits closer to home, in the form of health issues or family crises. It is easy to understand why you would like to be an ostrich and stick your head in the sand. The information overwhelming us today is difficult to accept. But what about the people who don't know Jesus? How do they cope, with all that society is pushing on them? We who know the Good News need to find ways to share it. We need to be brave, strong, and confident, for the world needs to know there is Hope! Jesus has indeed overcome the world! Who and what is Caring Ministries?
We are a team of members who started a care ministry here at Our Lord's six years ago. There was a need to support the elderly people who needed help with transportation to

doctor appointments, shopping, church services/programs or those dealing with health issues. With our short visits, and/or a hot meal, they don't feel alone. We also help younger families who've just had a baby, taking them a meal or doing hospital/home visits with those recuperating. We also support our members and their families after the loss of a loved one. We sit with a spouse or parent of a caregiver so the caregiver can get their hair done or run some errands. We hand out prayer shawls and baby blanket, knitted or crocheted by members of the United Methodist Women, to give loving comfort to those in need. The Youth Group has assisted us in making frozen meals that are kept at church, so church members could receive them through the Pastor or during our visits. Before COVID, we provided a welcoming table in the narthex for our Sunday visitors and provided some treats for the hospitality table.

During the past few years we hosted several speakers who educated us about programs in our nearby communities that offer assistance to those in need. Twice a year, with the help of the UMW, we held a Homebound Luncheon (with entertainment) for our church members who were unable to get to church. We host a monthly fellowship group called Monday Funday. Many of you have received a card from our Card Ministry, hopefully letting you know how important you are and that your church family is here to support you in any way needed.

We had started with a strong volunteer team of ten people, but due to different circumstances we are down to four people and are looking for more interested people to join us. Our funds come from Special Sunday Donations and a recent United Methodist Foundation Grant. These past eighteen months (with the pandemic) have been hard on us all, with the church doors closed and no visitations allowed anywhere, but we have stayed connected to our members and frequent visitors with our phone calls and Card Ministry. If you have a need for our assistance or you'd like to join our team, contact the church office or one of us: Rebecca Radick (coordinator), Chris Gygax, Karen Haubert, or Lynda McDowell. There's a quote: "To bring happiness and healing to others-volunteer." Pray to God to guide you where you can help out. God's blessings to all of you, our church family!

#### Volunteers Needed at The Gathering

The Gathering is in need of volunteers to help prepare and package meals for the homeless and hungry. I have volunteered once a week during the past year. It is a very safe volunteer opportunity as masks are required and we social distance. The volunteers do not interact with the guests as they pick up their to-go meals at the door, given out by The Gathering Coordinator.




