Join in the Worship on October 2nd for World Communion Sunday

Church and Society has led an awareness and fundraising effort in advance of Native American Boarding School Remembrance Day, (9/30/22) and which we are celebrating Sunday, October 2, 2022. T-shirt sales and donations over cost are being forwarded to the Wisconsin Inter Tribal Repatriation Committee which is dedicated to preserving historic Native American sites. This opportunity has been shared with Blessed Hope and Memorial UMC's, with gratitude for our connection.

As United Methodists, we come to the Table this World Communion Sunday with reparation and repentance on our minds and hearts as we consider the historic mistreatment of Native children in boarding schools, some run by the Methodist Church. We may not have had an actual hand in these cultural cleansing and eraser practices, however, we can elevate our voices in a collective prayer for forgiveness and in blessing the gift of reparation we offer:

Holy Creator of ALL, we come, humbled by historic actions that harmed children; forcibly removing them from their families, robbing them of their voice, their heritage and their very lives. We look reflectively and see with abhorrent awareness the nature of our white privilege and the nauseating abuse of power that overcame these innocent children and their families. Lord of healing and reconciliation, right us as we reckon with the mistakes of the past that we, personally, did not commit yet that in relationship and through connection we must bear the responsibility of ownership. Bless the surviving adults harmed in these schools with the strength to carry that awful history and experience and the resolve to carve out new stories and pathways of relationship in the days to come. Bless those working in the repatriation of historic sites and bless us with Your promised forgiveness and grace when we humbly repent. Lord, in Your mercy, hear this prayer. Amen.

After more than a year of research, conversation and prayer, the ALB approved the following land acknowledgment statement to be listed on our church website. There will also be an outdoor marker at some point in the future.

Land Acknowledgment for Our Lord's United Methodist Church

- ~ We acknowledge the Algonquin language family*, who for countless generations, have been the traditional custodians of the land on which we gather.
- ~ We acknowledge that in September 1833, representatives of the Chippewa, Ottawa and Potawatomi ceded southeastern Wisconsin to the United States government.
- ~ We acknowledge, today, the pain and suffering that came before and after the unjust land acquisition from which we benefit.
- ~ We honor the continued contributions made to our state by the Algonquin language family.


Coming for October! Pastor Kelly & Amplify Media Team Up to Teach!



All books must be paperbacks; no hard covers are allowed.
Books must be in good shape (not yellowed or torn or missing pages).

Vaccine Information from the Wisconsin Council of Churches

This information comes to us via the statewide Wisconsin Council of Churches Community Health Program Director, Dan Schultz. We offer it here as a way of sharing tools that enable the Our Lord's community to remain healthy and our building open for daily gathering and use.

Dear Friends,

Bivalent COVID vaccines are now being distributed around the nation, and health authorities are encouraging people 12 and older to get a fall booster with the new shots.

Wait, slow down. What's a "bivalent vaccine"?

Simply put, it's a vaccine that protects against two forms of disease. In this case, that's the original strain of COVID and its Omicron variant.

Why is that important?

Again, simply put, two is better than one! The new boosters offer broader protection in fewer doses - the hope is one per year, in the same way that people get a flu shot every fall.

Should I get the new shot?

Oh my, yes! (You should get a flu shot too.)

Unless, that is, you're just getting over a case of COVID, or if you've received a booster in the past two months. In that case, it's better to wait a little while. But for most people, a periodic booster is the best way to protect themselves and loved ones from severe illness and hospitalization. That's particularly important if you're over 50 or immunocompromised.

Is there a "but" coming here?

Not about the new boosters, no. You absolutely **should** get one as soon as you can. On a social level, however, things are a bit more complicated. You absolutely should not take the release of these new boosters as a sign that things are "getting back to normal" yet.

For one thing, [flu is a lot more predictable than COVID](#) at this point. It comes around on a regular schedule, it changes in predictable ways, and it's been around for a very long time, which helps us keep an eye out for new variants.

For another, there are still many people who have not received a first dose of the COVID vaccine, much less a booster. And scientists still aren't sure how long the protection offered by a booster dose lasts, in large part because they haven't had the chance to study COVID boosters in the same way they have influenza vaccines.

None of this is a reason to skip a booster: some length of protection is better than none. But it is to say that we're not anywhere near having COVID be just like the flu. God willing, we'll get there someday, but it's not today.

So what do we need to do?

Katelyn Jetelina argues that [we need to up our vaccine game](#) to finally "normalize" COVID, including vaccines that work on mucosal tissues, against all coronaviruses, or in combining protection against both flu and COVID.

I would add that we need to keep up the same precautions that we've been practicing for what seems like forever:

1. Avoid crowds
2. Wear a mask in areas of high transmission or if you've been exposed to someone with COVID
3. Stay home if you've tested positive or even if you're just not feeling well.

The desire to get back to a post-crisis "normal" life is understandable. The way we get to that point, though, is to accept that "normal" comes along with some unfamiliar routines. That includes getting a regular booster and working to slow the spread of COVID as best we can. The good news is, we can do it.

“Grace be to you and peace, from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ.”
Ephesians 1:2

How we deal with people who are different from ourselves says much about our Christian growth. In Jesus' ministry, **need** was the determining factor, not race, sex, social standing, or religion.

One of the stories of Mother Teresa's life of Christian service in Calcutta says that when she first arrived and tried to establish a hospice for the homeless who had previously died in the streets, the saintly nun and her fellow Sisters faced hostility from the neighborhood, not wanting the church's “Home for the Dying” in their backyard.

The Catholic mission was next to a Hindu temple and it was there that a Hindu priest came down with terminal tuberculosis and the hospital would only admit people who could be cured. So the priest had no bed or place for him to go. That's when Mother Teresa stepped in to bring him into her hospice and tended to him. When the priest died, she delivered his body to the Hindu temple for their Hindu rites. The news of Mother Teresa's ecumenical compassion spread throughout the city and the rest is history. Mother Teresa's secret was not to outlive her detractors, but to out-love them!

In the above verse, Paul is writing a letter to the Ephesians about God and the church. But not just **A** church, but **The** church, for it doesn't matter **where** it is, but **that** it is. A congregation can disappear, but the Lord's Word will never disappear! The Lord's Kingdom is not of the earth.

Dear Lord, thank you for the men and women of faith who left us their legacy. Help us here at OLUMC to be able to leave a legacy, by living lives based on examples You taught- in our faith, in our speech, in our actions, and in our love. AMEN.


